THE CORNER SHELF

In July of last year, we began operating the food shelf in our building, after having partnered with Merrick Community Services for over ten years. It's been a lot of work, but also very successful! In October we transitioned to a "custom curbside" system: clients choose the food they'd like from what we have available, and our staff and volunteers pack it up and bring it to their cars. In this way, we're able to provide culturally relevant food that meets each family's needs through a system that honors clients' dignity and offers them choice. It also cuts down on food waste for both them and us, and costs 19% less per family.

We've seen a staggering increase in the number of families we're serving too – from an average of 87 households per week to 223! We saw a 24% increase when we shifted to custom curbside, but another huge increase took place when government food support for low income families was reduced. The SNAP program (formerly known as food stamps) had increased benefits during COVID, but the increases disappeared in March and since then our numbers have more than doubled.

We're honored to be able to offer high-quality food to serve our community. Of course our food fundraisers have been critical to help us keep up with demand, and we will continue to strive to meet rising food needs as best we can.

TINY HOMES

Our partnership with Settled continues at full steam. We donated six tiny homes that were built by volunteers from Woodland and other churches to help launch the first Sacred Settlement at Mosaic Church in St. Paul. They held their grand opening in October, which was a huge milestone! In December, another two homes were donated to Prince of Peace Lutheran in Roseville for an interim tiny home community.

We also finished the production/warehouse facility here at Woodland Hills, which is already making the construction of tiny homes more efficient. This summer three more houses will be completed, and we will have eight homes on site as a "display" community. We also hope to create a more naturalized, eco-friendly space for the display this year. We're blessed to be part of this unique opportunity to serve our chronically homeless neighbors.

CREATION CARE

Our church leadership and staff have been striving to be better stewards of the impact our ministries have on creation. We've started using compostable cups and plates, cloth tablecloths, and metal silverware at our gatherings, and we're doing what we can to minimize our use of plastic. If you were at our Good Friday service, you used our new stainless steel communion cups! In the coming year, pending the approval from the city, we also hope to improve our watershed impact by replacing some of our north end parking lot with a more naturalized landscape, and our food shelf will begin composting expired food. At today's picnic, you also saw the first use of our new compost bins for food scraps!



NEW SERMON SERIES

Our Unraveling Truth sermon series is lasting longer than expected (to nobody's surprise). After it's over, we're planning a new extended series on the book of Revelation. "Revelation" means uncovering, and bringing to light what's been hidden. This often-confusing book is all about revealing truth and unmasking lies, and we hope the series will help us all wake up to the lies we've been tricked into believing, and reorient our lives around truth!



JESUS COLLECTIVE

We've been an official Jesus Collective partner for two years, but Greg and Paul have been involved since its inception. We continue to be excited about the ways this group of churches and leaders is ushering in a new movement that puts Jesus at the center of everything – we have much in common and they feel like "our people." We're hosting our first Jesus Collective gathering on June 1-2, and are exploring other ways we can support this movement.
